

















Muse Arts





THE BRIDGE OF AN INDIAN ERA

The India, also known as the golden sparrow in ancient times covers a huge margin of its rich cultural diversity of India. The variety of cultures not only represents the traditions but also the different art forms of the cultures. The art forms do not get limited to some boundaries and there are many art forms still yet to be discovered in India alone. Some of the magnificent and beautiful folk art forms include folk paintings, dance, pottery paintings, decorative plates, sculpture making, etc. These art forms are an essential resource for maintaining the medieval past in Indian history and its artifacts. They even contain hidden meanings and some try to convey a message regarding the culture and heritage or to represent their devotion to the Hindu Gods.

But the folk paintings, steeped in the Indian tradition, often encountered the pull of modernity and in this rapidly evolving world, these art forms hold the challenge of remaining relevant while preserving their authenticity. Yet, these contemporary artists are working on new styles, and techniques into these traditional forms, making a seamless connection of the past and present. The tension between tradition and modernity is not a conflict, but rather an opportunity for evolution and enrichment of the Indian society. The traditional aspects of folk paintings are essential assets through generations. They encapsulate the essence of a community's history, beliefs, and practices, often reflecting their connection with nature, spirituality, and everyday life. These traditional elements are the heartbeats of folk art, carrying within them the whispers of ancestors and the cultural soul of a people. They serve as cultural artifacts, preserving stories and wisdom that are an integral part of the collective identity.

However, in this swiftly transforming world, folk paintings are faced with the challenge of modernity. The question that arises is how to make these traditional art forms appealing to modern sensibilities, without diluting or disturbing their essence. The answer lies in the hands of contemporary artists who, with ingenious vision, are orchestrating a remarkable dance between the past and the present. While rooted in local contexts, folk paintings have gained international acclaim. This mix of modernity raises many questions about cultural change in the global world. The most vital fond paintings and common of some of the Indian paintings include Kalamkari paintings, Pattachitra paintings, Pithora paintings, Cond





paintings, Tanjore paintings, and many more. The Madhubani painting is a style of painting that is practiced in the Mithila region of Bihar state. Pattachitra is a general term for traditional, cloth-based scroll painting, based in the eastern Indian state, of Odisha. In the Sanskrit language, "Patta" literally means "cloth" and "Chitra" means "picture". These are drawn on palm leaves and specially inspired by Jagannath and Vaishnava sect and it's designed with natural colors, with no pencils or charcoal used. Coming to The Kalighat paintings, are popularly practiced in the state of Kolkata, The charm of the Kalighat paintings lies in the fact that they capture the essence of daily life and they influence modern artists like the late Jamini Roy even to this day. Next is the Warli paintings that occupy mainly the Gujarat-Maharashtra border. Kalamkari is a painting done by Kalam (pen). These paintings are made in Andhra Pradesh. It is hand painted as well as block printing with vegetable dyes applied on cloth. Vegetable dyes are used for color in the Kalam Kari work. The pen used is made of sharp pointed bamboo, used to regulate the flow of colors. A small place Sri-Kalahasti is the best-known centre of Kalamkari art. This work is also found at Masaulipatnam in Andhra Pradesh. There are still numerous paintings that are not so popular but represent the versatility of Indian culture.

To conclude, Folk paintings of Indian culture are a symphony of contradictions, seamlessly woven into a larger context that defines the country's cultural fabric. Beyond the material or the texture, these art forms define resilience, safeguard traditional wisdom, foster community pride, fuel cultural tourism, and celebrate diversity. As India jumps itself into the modern era, folk paintings stand as bridges that link the past with the present, ensuring that the nation's cultural heritage remains vibrant and epic. In their exquisite brushstrokes and vibrant hues, these paintings tell stories that roar across time, forging many viable connections between generations and sustaining the richness of India's identity. The process of merging the culture between the eras is a testament to the enduring nature of culture, the wisdom of tradition, and the creative spirit of innovation. Folk paintings, as they tread the delicate tightrope between the old and the new, remind us that tradition need not be static, and that relevance can be found in embracing change. In this dance of the past and present, folk art becomes a hope for the vibrant cultural forms of human expression and the ever-evolving nature of artistic designs

Litti Chokha: A Hearty and Flavorful Dish from Bihar

Litti chokha is a traditional dish from the Indian state of Bihar. It is made with a dough of whole wheat flour, stuffed with a mixture of roasted sattu (chickpea flour), spices, and herbs, and served with a side of roasted eggplant and tomato mash. Litti chokha is a popular street food in Bihar and is also served in many restaurants.

The dish is said to have originated in the Mithila region of Bihar. The name "litti" comes from the hindi word "lutti", which means "ball". The littis are made by rolling out the dough into balls and then stuffing them with the sattu mixture. The littis are then cooked on a griddle or pan until they are golden brown.

The chokha is made by roasting the eggplant and tomatoes until they are soft. The roasted eggplant and tomatoes are then mashed together with spices and herbs. The chokha is served with the littis.





Instructions:

- To make the dough, combine the flour, ghee, and salt in a mixing bowl. Gradually
 add water and knead until the dough is soft and smooth. Cover the dough and let it
 rest for 30 minutes.
- To make the stuffing, combine the sattu, ginger, green chilies, cilantro, lemon juice, mustard oil, black salt, and salt to taste in a mixing bowl. Mix well.

Ingredients:

- For the dough:
 - 2 cups whole wheat flour 1 tablespoon ghee 1/4 teaspoon salt Water as needed
- For the chokha:

1 eggplant, roasted and peeled 2 tomatoes, roasted and peeled 1 clove of garlic, minced

For the stuffing:

1 cup roasted sattu
(chickpea flour)
1 inch piece of ginger, grated
1-2 green chilies, chopped
1/2 cup chopped cilantro
1 teaspoon of lemon juice
1 teaspoon mustard oil
1/4 teaspoon black salt
Salt to taste

1 tablespoon mustard oil Salt to taste Lemon juice to taste

- To make the chokha, mash the eggplant and tomatoes together. Add the garlic, mustard oil, salt, and lemon juice to taste. Mix well.
- 4. Divide the dough into equal portions. Roll out each portion into a circle about 2 inches in diameter. Place a heaping teaspoon of the stuffing in the centre of each circle. Fold the dough over the stuffing and seal the edges.
- Heat a griddle or pan over medium heat.Cook the littis on both sides until they are golden brown and cooked through.
- 6. Serve the littis hot with the chokha. Enjoy!






FROM MEGA SET TO MINI SET






THE ART OF MAKING SHEA BUTTER

Women in Ghana have produced shea butter from shea nuts (Vitelleria paradoxa) for centuries until recent times have witnessed the felling of shea nut-bearing trees, erasing the primary livelihood for these women. However, the art of making shea butter is enduring in the country.

Shea butter has a long history of use and is well known for its therapeutic and aesthetic benefits. Recent statistics have shown a surge in demand for shea butter, which can aid in healing first-degree burns and serve as an anti-aging lotion. Shea trees are found flourishing along the savannah belt that connects East and West Africa.



The seed is then suitable to be converted into butter in the following step of breaking when its kernel rattles within the shell after drying. The healthy nuts are used to manufacture shea butter, whilst the unhealthy nuts are either turned into fertilizer or turned into a dish called "Kanwu." This procedure of separating the good nuts from the bad ones is what distinguishes this form of art from shea butter that is produced commercially.

The nuts are later crushed into powder form using a brick. This powder is heated over an open flame in a pot until its aroma is released. The roasted fragrance powder is given a nutty flavor and before being stone-ground to a smooth, creamy consistency. Numerous roasted shea nuts are ground in a time-consuming procedure, and the pulp is then gathered in a pot. More than two ladies thoroughly mix the collected paste in a pot for an hour till the desired consistency is obtained. Water is then added to the paste to initiate the butter-forming process. The water is slowly added to the paste while the butter that has formed will float on top of it. This is collected into another container which is melted using firewood.

Upon melting butter, it takes on a dark chocolate brown hue. The white layer of butter is removed and replaced with pure shea oil once it has melted completely and settled. After being transformed into solid shea butter, this commodity is then sold in the marketplaces. Small batches are produced because this is a laborious process to guarantee quality.

Since commercial businesses have taken over these items where shea butter is created more quickly, this art has been losing popularity today. However, nothing can match the quality of shea butter produced using this natural approach. Besides battling deforestation, these women face the challenge of preserving their sole income source. They call shea butter 'a symbol of prosperity and independence.' They want to preserve their culture and pass down this heritage to future generations.



The journey from Visakhapatnam to the Amarnath Cave is quite lengthy. But, the experience is totally worth it. Along the way, you'll come across Sri Mata

Vaishno Devi Katra, which is another pilgrimage site in Jammu and Kashmir. Katra is a town situated at the base of Trikuta Hills where you'll find the Vaishno Devi shrine. To reach the hilltop pilgrims have two options; they can. Take a thrilling helicopter ride. Or opt for a 13 km trek.







On your way to Amarnath, you'll encounter Pahalgam, a hill station nestled in Kashmir. This charming place is the starting point for the trek to Amarnath Cave. The trek spans 52 km. Typically it takes around four to five days to complete. As you traverse through meadows, forests and mountains along this trail there are spots where pilgrims can rest and spend their nights.

One of the parts of the trek is the challenging climb to reach Seshnaag Lake, an elevated lake positioned at an altitude of 3,600 meters, above sea level. This sacred lake holds significance for both Hindus and Muslims.


Another demanding stretch of the trek entails ascending to Maha Ganesha Top, a mountain pass situated at 4,800





Pratyusha: I want to start a start-up in the coming years but firstly I want to learn business ethics and corporate working styles which will help me to fit into that environment.



Poojitha: My suggestion is to be perfect in any one of the programming languages from basics(including Data Structures - algorithms) to advanced if you are aiming for a campus placement (be it C, Java or Python). Practicing to solve problems on online platforms improves your skills. Also, updating your profile with your projects in GitHub will be helpful during interviews. My recruitment process involved a tech-based round where I was posed with some basic yet important questions that made me score a job.

Vachas: Looking back, is there anything you wish you had known or done differently during your university years to better prepare for your career? and how can students make the most of such opportunities?

Poojitha: Yeah I regret not joining clubs a bit earlier since I participated in CEA in my 3rd year. I think being involved in technical or non-technical clubs provides us a wonderful opportunity to interact with our seniors and improve our leadership qualities which are helpful later on. As my mentor suggested, I would tell them to work hard during work hours and explore, relax, and have fun during the rest of the time.

Vachas: Could you kindly recount your journey, from starting as an intern to successfully securing a full-time position at Barclays? Were there any unexpected turns or valuable insights you gained during this transition

Poojitha: Most companies pick interns and check if they are adaptable or not. As you know I got into Barclays through campus placement by mentioning I'm good at Java and software testing and ready to learn new things. After my internship, I've realized and learned non-technical stuff such as collaborating with other team members unlike being an extrovert only with my friend circle. Overall, This period teaches us how to be a professional that transforms us from student behaviour.

Vachas: What advice would you give to future interns looking to make a successful transition into a full-time role?

Poojitha: During college, I would advise them to practice coding since it is that important, since not only do your communication skills matter, at least not always. Also, always ask questions to your mentors or seniors whenever they are raised, and get them clarified instantly. My sincere suggestion is to make social interactions part of your life.





Vachas: Did you have a mentor during your internship? How did their guidance contribute to your professional growth?

Poojitha: My team lead at Barclays has been my mentor throughout my intern period. As it was my first time in the corporate phase, everything felt new to me. But he made us feel comfortable with other colleagues by personally introducing them and other team leads. He advised us to come out of our comfort zone to interact with other groups. He assigned me simple tasks at the beginning regarding testing and ordered me to learn Python to upskill my experience. He literally explained several coding techniques from what's important to what's not. Such guidance from him was to be followed and definitely contributed to my professional growth.

Vachas: Thank you so much for sharing your experiences and insights with us today. We truly appreciate your time and wish you heartfelt congratulations on your future endeavours. BOOK FAIR 2022


