NCC DRILL INSTRUCTOR VISIT – OCTOBER 2025

A comprehensive NCC drill training session was organised last week under the guidance of a Drill Ustad deputed from the NCC Tenali Battalion. The objective of this session was to strengthen the cadets' drill discipline, improve physical endurance, and enhance readiness for the upcoming NCC B and C Certificate examinations. The Ustad, known for his experience and dedication, conducted the training with enthusiasm, motivating cadets while maintaining strict discipline.

This session served as an essential part of the cadets' overall training, providing them the opportunity to refine basic and advanced drill skills, interact with trained instructors, and gain a deeper understanding of NCC values.

ASSEMBLY AND TURNOUT

The cadets reported sharp at 3:30 pm on the NCC ground, maintaining punctuality and discipline. Y25 cadets arrived in NCC track suits complete with berets and belts, while Y24 and Y23 senior cadets reported in well-pressed NCC uniforms. Before the Ustad arrived, the senior cadets quickly organised the parade, ensured proper alignment of ranks, adjusted spacing, and guided the juniors on how to stand at attention and ease. The act of forming the parade itself played an essential role in setting the tone for the entire session. Junior cadets observed the discipline, posture, and responsibility displayed by seniors, while seniors practiced leadership by helping juniors correct turnout, spacing, and bearing. This pre-session organisation helped reinforce foundational parade etiquette and built uniformity within the group.

WARM-UP AND PHYSICAL TRAINING

VISITS AND INTERACTIONS

The camp witnessed several visits and inspections by senior officers from the **Guntur Group Headquarters**. Their presence added motivation and inspiration to all participants. The **Group Commander Sir** interacted with cadets, inspecting their drills, line areas, and cultural preparations. He appreciated their confidence, teamwork, and dedication towards NCC ideals.

Interactive sessions were conducted where cadets raised questions about career opportunities in the armed forces, the significance of leadership, and the challenges of military life. Officers shared valuable insights and personal experiences, reinforcing the importance of perseverance, courage, and responsibility.

DRILL TRAINING BY THE DRILL USTAD

Once the cadets were fully warmed up, the Drill Ustad took charge of the session. His approach was professional yet approachable. He greeted the parade, inspected their formation, and explained the plan for the day. The Ustad emphasised that drill is not merely a physical activity but a combination of discipline, coordination, presence of mind, and teamwork. He demonstrated each movement slowly and clearly before allowing cadets to practice. His corrections were precise, pointing out heel angles, hand swing height, chin position, shoulder straightness, and alignment within the squad. The Ustad's detailed instructions helped cadets understand the significance of every movement in portraying discipline during parades, official functions, and NCC events.

BASIC DRILL TRAINING FOR Y25 CADETS

Y25 cadets practiced foundational drill movements essential for every NCC parade. These included:

- Kadam thal
- Peeche kadam thal
- Tez chal
- Saamne salute
- Peeche mud
- Bhai mud
- Dhaine mud
- Stamping march

ADVANCED DRILL TRAINING FOR Y24 AND Y23 CADETS

Senior cadets practiced more advanced and synchronised drill movements such as:

- Chalte chalte salute
- Peeche ghum
- Bhai ghum
- Advanced parade formations
- Command execution and timing
- Long-distance coordinated marching

INTERACTION WITH THE DRILL USTAD

One of the most valuable aspects of the session was the Ustad's direct interaction with the cadets. He corrected mistakes patiently, addressing each cadet by position, guiding them on how to maintain alertness and discipline even during rest positions.

He shared insights on improving command response time, coordinating arm swings, maintaining straight lines during marching, and keeping focus during long parade practices.

His friendly yet disciplined nature made cadets feel motivated and confident. The Ustad also shared small but important details, such as maintaining quietness during fall-in, keeping boots aligned when standing, and understanding parade hierarchy. These interactions helped cadets develop leadership qualities, respect for protocol, and a professional attitude toward NCC responsibilities..

THEORY SESSION

After the practical drill, a short but informative theory session was conducted. The Ustad explained the theoretical importance of drill, how it builds unity and discipline, and how it is used in military organisations to maintain order and precision. Cadets also learned about the structure of B and C Certificate examinations, including drill evaluation patterns, parade commands, uniform standards, turn-out inspection procedures, and common mistakes that affect scoring. The theory class provided clarity on how drill contributes to shaping a cadet's personality, discipline, and command capabilities. It also helped cadets understand the significance of mental alertness in drill practice, not just physical movements.

NCC SONG AND FORMAL CONCLUSION

At the end of the session, all cadets fell in again and stood in formation to sing the NCC song with enthusiasm and unity. Singing the NCC song together created a sense of pride, belonging, and motivation among all batches. The Ustad appreciated the cadets for their dedication, punctuality, and willingness to learn. He encouraged them to continue practicing regularly and maintaining uniform standards. His concluding remarks served as inspiration for cadets to continue improving and preparing sincerely for upcoming B and C Certificate examinations..

OVERALL IMPACT OF THE TRAINING SESSION

The session had a profound impact on cadets across all batches. Juniors gained clarity and confidence in fundamental drill movements, while seniors strengthened their advanced skills and leadership qualities. The physical training improved stamina and resilience. The session also enhanced team spirit, discipline, time management, and uniform etiquette among cadets. Cadets felt more prepared for examinations, parades, and future NCC responsibilities. The friendly guidance from the Ustad encouraged cadets to stay dedicated to NCC values and aim for excellence.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND SENIOR–JUNIOR COORDINATION

One of the most notable outcomes of the session was the development of leadership qualities among senior cadets and the strengthening of coordination between different batches. Senior cadets from Y24 and Y23 led the parade formation, corrected junior cadets' posture, and supervised warm-up and running activities. This practical involvement played a significant role in building their confidence, command presence, and ability to guide others—a key requirement for NCC B and C Certificate

examinations. Juniors closely observed the seniors' behaviour, discipline, and drill accuracy, which motivated them to improve. This leadership chain helped maintain order throughout the session and created an environment where every cadet learned teamwork, respect for hierarchy, and mutual cooperation. The experience strengthened the bond between batches and promoted unity within the unit.

PREPARATION FOR FUTURE NCC EVENTS AND EXAMINATIONS

With several important NCC events approaching, including college-level parades, battalion inspections, and the B and C Certificate examinations, this session played an essential role in preparing cadets for upcoming responsibilities. The Ustad explained how each drill movement contributes to scoring in practical examinations and guided cadets on avoiding common errors such as improper timing, lack of synchronisation, and inconsistent bearing. Seniors refined their advanced drill skills, which contributes directly to their exam confidence, while juniors built a strong foundation required for future camps and parades. The session also helped cadets understand the importance of regular practice, turnout maintenance, and mental discipline. By the end of the training, cadets felt more prepared, more responsible, and more aware of the standards expected in formal NCC assessments and events, ensuring better performance in future activities.

CADET FEEDBACK

Cadets expressed extremely positive feedback about the training session. They appreciated the Ustad's teaching style, the clarity with which commands were explained, and the chance to correct small but important mistakes. Many cadets mentioned that the session helped them understand the deeper significance of drill, improved their stamina through PT, and boosted their confidence for exams. Juniors noted that learning alongside seniors motivated them to improve faster, while seniors felt proud to assist and guide juniors.

CONCLUSION

The NCC drill training session conducted under the supervision of the Drill Ustad from NCC Tenali Battalion was highly successful and productive. It provided cadets with strong foundational knowledge, advanced drill refinement, physical fitness improvement, and a deeper sense of discipline and teamwork. The session concluded with cadets motivated, confident, and better prepared for upcoming NCC events, parades, and certificate examinations.
