OBJECTIVES

The primary objectives of organizing a seminar on cancer awareness for high school students are to educate and inform them about the various aspects of cancer, including its causes, prevention strategies, early detection methods, and available treatments. The seminar effectively dispelled misconceptions and reduced stigmas associated with cancer, fostering a more compassionate and informed student body. It also inspired a sense of responsibility among the participants, who have since been actively promoting healthier lifestyles and cancer prevention practices among their peers and families. The event served as a catalyst for the formation of a supportive and informed youth community committed to raising cancer awareness, ultimately contributing to a more health-conscious and empathetic society. The following aspects were discussed.

Cervical cancer develops in a woman's cervix (the entrance to the uterus from the vagina). Almost all cervical cancer cases (99%) are linked to infection with high risk human papillomavirus (HPV), an extremely common virus transmitted through sexual contact. Although most infections with HPV resolve spontaneously and cause no symptoms, persistent infection can cause cervical cancer in women. Cervical cancer is the 6th most common cancer in women in the Eastern Mediterranean Region. In 2020, an estimated 89

800 women were diagnosed with cervical cancer in the Region and more than 47 500 women died from the disease.

On this Cervical Cancer Awareness Month, the messages are clear. Cervical Cancer Awareness Month also comes at a time when the world continues to live through the COVID-19 pandemic, where substantial disruptions to essential health services persist. So during this month and beyond, let us work together, during and post-COVID-19, to build healthier communities by improving access to effective primary (HPV vaccination) and secondary prevention (screening for and treating precancerous lesions) to eliminate #cervicalcancer. Cervical cancer develops in a woman's cervix, which is the entrance to the uterus from the vagina. Almost all (99%) cervical cancer cases are linked to infection with high-risk human papillomavirus (HPV), an extremely common virus transmitted through sexual contact. Human papillomavirus (HPV) is the most common viral infection of the reproductive tract. Most sexually active women and men will be infected at some point in their lives and some may be repeatedly infected. HPV is sexually transmitted, but penetrative sex is not required for transmission. Skin-to-skin genital contact is a well-recognized mode of transmission. There are many types of HPV, and many do not cause problems. HPV infections usually clear up without any intervention within a few months after acquisition, and about 90% clear within 2 years. A small proportion of infections with certain types of HPV can persist and progress to cervical cancer. Women Development Cell (WDC) of KLEF organized cervical cancer awareness event for the benefit of students in adolescence age. They went to class to class and publicized about Get informed. Find out the facts about cervical cancer and the human papilloma virus (HPV) that causes it. Help educate other women in your life too. Get screened. Cervical cancer screening typically starts at age 30 and is repeated periodically. Get vaccinated. The HPV vaccine is given in 2 doses that should begin when a girl is between 9 and 14 years old
